16⁰⁰ COFFEE AND FAREWELL

Aesthetic practices, i.e., lingual and non-lingual competences of shaping, creating and experiencing the world, are core skills of practitioners in the field of art, design and architecture. Yet, recent changes in the university system, such as the academization and harmonization of higher education and the need to theorize, reflect and systematically analyse the discipline's own skills, have led to new discussions about the understandings of aesthetic practices.

Building on its rich tradition in analysing knowledge production in the hard sciences, a growing number of Science and Technology Studies (STS) scholars have become interested in artistic disciplines and started to analyse them in analogy to the natural sciences. Using approaches such as laboratory studies and actor-network theory (ANT), STS scholars analysed the research practices and the specific epistemic basis of fields like architecture, design and the fine arts.

This workshop will focus on how STS methods and approaches can be used to analyse architecture, art and design as well as their specific practices. Furthermore, a particular emphasis lies in the question, how the methodological and conceptual tools could be shaped to give consideration to the specific aesthetic understandings and situations of knowledge production in these fields. Thus, the workshop will also consider cultural studies perspectives from within the analysed disciplines. A last discussion topic will be on institutional transformations and their impact on knowledge production and the education of aesthetic practices.

Therefore, the aim of this workshop is threefold: First, it will discuss how aesthetic practices in architecture, design and the fine arts have been conceptualized by STS analyses. Second, it will ask what STS might learn from methodologies of artistic disciplines and third, it will discuss some of the consequences of institutional changes in those fields.
